The Lord says this: I am coming to gather the nations of every language. They shall come to witness my glory. I will give them a sign and send some of their survivors to the nations: to Tarshish, Put, Lud, Moshech, Rosh, Tubal, and Javan, to the distant islands that have never heard of me or seen my glory. They will proclaim my glory to the nations. As an offering to the Lord they will bring all your brothers, on horses, in chariots, in litters, on mules, on dromedaries, from all the nations to my holy mountain in Jerusalem, says the Lord, like Israelites bringing oblations in clean vessels to the Temple of the Lord. And of some of them I will make priests and Levites, says the Lord. **The word of the Lord.**

Responsorial Psalm: Go out to all the world; and tell the Good News.**Second Reading: Letter to the Hebrews 12:5-7,11-13**

Have you forgotten that encouraging text in which you are addressed as sons? My son, when the Lord corrects you, do not treat it lightly; but do not get discouraged when he reprimands you. For the Lord trains the ones that he loves and he punishes all those that he acknowledges as his sons. Suffering is part of your training; God is treating you as his sons. Has there ever been any son whose father did not train him? Of course, any punishment is most painful at the time, and far from pleasant; but later, in those on whom it has been used, it bears fruit in peace and goodness. So hold up your limp arms and steady your trembling knees and smooth

out the path you tread; then the injured limb will not be wrenched, it will grow strong again.

Gospel Acclamation: Alleluia, alleluia! I am the way, the truth and the life, says the Lord; no-one comes to the Father, except through me. **Alleluia!**

Gospel: Luke 13:22-30

Through towns and villages Jesus went teaching, making his way to Jerusalem. Someone said to him “Sir, will there be only a few saved?” He said to them “Try your best to enter by the narrow door, because I tell you, many will try to enter and will not succeed. “Once the master of the house has got up and locked the door, you may find yourself knocking on the door, saying “Lord, open to us” but he will answer, “I do not know where you come from.” Then you will find yourself saying “We once ate and drank in your company; you taught in our streets” but he will reply, “I do not know where you come from. Away from me, all you wicked men!” ‘Then there will be weeping and grinding of teeth, when you see Abraham and Isaac and Jacob and all the prophets in the kingdom of God, and yourselves turned outside. And men from east and west, from north and south, will come to take their places at the feast in the Kingdom of God. “Yes, there are those now last who will be first, and those now first who will be last.” **The Gospel of the Lord**

Today, we welcome members of the Noonan families as they gather to remember the 70th anniversary of death of Francis Joseph Patrick Noonan and the 25th anniversary of death of Mary Jane (Jean) Noonan (nee Stapleton). The Noonan and Stapleton families have a long history of service in our Parish and we too give thanks for their dedication.



Mary Jane was the eldest child born to Edward and Maryanne Stapleton (nee Mc Loughlin) in the Parish of Carbury, Co, Kildare, Ireland on the 23rd August 1903, she had two brothers Edward (Eddy) and James (Jim) both deceased. The family left Ireland for Australia on 23rd August 1913, arriving in Fremantle on 7th October 1913. Jean left school at 14 years of age and gained employment as a waitress. Over the years she worked in Katanning, Bridgetown and Perth before marrying Frank Noonan on 21 April 1930. Jean was kept busy with her

family and looking after her elderly parents. After Frank died life became very busy for her providing meals for her two sons on the farm as well as looking after her home in town. Jean passed away on 22 August 1999, two days short of her 94th birthday, and was survived by her children Francis (Frank) Michael, Mary, Terence, Desmond and Margaret.



Francis was the 6th child and 4th son born to William Joseph and Jane Noonan at Albany on 14th September 1888. He enlisted in the Australia Imperial Force and served in Heytesbury UK and France and was discharged in 1919. He married Mary Jane and they established “Carbury” farm. During the Depression following WWII they were forced to leave the farm and move to Katanning where Frank was employed by Mr Jim Old at his general carting business. In the early 1950’s he returned to the farm with two of his sons Frank and Terrence. His grandson Kim now runs Carbury. Frank died in 1952 aged 63 years and was

survived by his wife Jean, and their children Francis (Frank) , Michael, Mary, Terence, Desmond and Margaret.

NEXT WEEK’S READINGS: 22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time: August 28th 2022: Ecclesiasticus 3:17-20,28-29; Letter to the Hebrews 12:18-19,22-24; Luke 14:1,7-14
